### **Europe and Eurasia Board Meeting**

**MASS Project meeting** – only for CCs who are participants of the MASS project (Netherlands, Greece, Latvia, Poland, Estonia, Czech Republic, Germany, Cyprus).

**Welcome at Pernera Hotel** 

30<sup>th</sup> April - Wednesday - Country Coordinators

**Welcome** by Ministry of Education in Cyprus, GLOBE Cyprus, Chair of the Board and Regional Office The meeting was opened by the host – Country Coordinator of Cyprus Anastasios Isaac and representatives of the GLOBE Program Regional Office Dana Votapkova and Bara Semerakova and Yioula Neophytou-Magniti from the Cyprus Ministry of Education and Culture.

**Introduction of participants** – country coordinators, scientists and trainers from 20 countries joined the meeting.

### Recapitulation of the last year and updates

Karl T. Hetland, the Chair of Board, informed participants about coming elections for the Board. Bara Semerakova gave update on activities the Regional Office. There is around 20 active countries in the region, their activities are often presented as Stars or in GLOBE Newsletter. Regional Office supports collaboration among GLOBE countries through EU funding: 1) 8 countries collect good examples from science education under the MASS Project, RHDO is the main coordinator; 2) there are several networks of GLOBE schools that applied for funding for students visits (EU Comenius Program – since 2014 transformed into Erasmus Plus Program).

TEREZA Association continues as a RHDO, new contract was signed for the period May 2014-May 2015. Since there are changes currently going on in the management of the GLOBE Program, office will have some more responsibilities and the name will be changed into Regional Coordination Office. The main focus of the office now: activate schools (Picture Contest), analyze results of the aerosol campaign, and develop online collaboration on European section of globe.gov.

### **Aerosol Campaign**

Danielle de Staerke (GLOBE France) and Elise Hendriks (KNMI) presented the campaign that schools around region joined to investigate air pollution events in their place. Extremely high air pollution events occurred in some cities in France in the time that falls into the spring campaign period. There was also a cloud of dust from Sahara transferring over Europe. We expect that school aerosol data will cover these events.

The iSPEX campaign in Netherlands has been developed. Currently there are negotiations with ESA to launch a campaign to engage citizens into measuring aerosol with iSPEX instrument in more countries. Go to <a href="Presentation">Presentation</a>

### GLOBE Learning Expedition 2014 in India – Bara Semerakova

General information <u>about GLE</u> was showed through the website. BS addressed participants to assist their active schools to register and find financial resources to participate in GLE 2014.

Several CCs confirmed that students who presented at international GLOBE events gained unique experience that enhanced their participation in GLOBE. CCs shared thoughts on fundraising for a school to cover expenses of their trip (support by school community, local municipality, fundraising events such as markets, campaigns....). Magda, Matthijs, Ilona and Diana are willing to share their experience with supporting schools.

### GLOBE Alumni - Dana Votapkova

GLOBE Alumni are individuals who are still very much tied with GLOBE, even though they are no longer students of a GLOBE school. Usually they are highly motivated to remain a part of GLOBE community in their country. The most common cases of their further involvement in GLOBE were presented: volunteer during local/national events, assist to implement GLOBE at schools, become ambassadors of GLOBE Program in various professional environments, use their skills to help GLOBE CC (translations, photographers, IT, PR...).

Israel has experience with Alumni introducing GLOBE to elementary schools. Some of Poland and Czech Republic Alumni became GLOBE teachers/scientists. Estonia has also experience with Alumni close cooperating with country coordinator.

The next steps we want to encourage Alumni is to make them more visible, communicate the benefits that Alumni bring to GLOBE in countries and connect Alumni internationally through globe.gov.

### MASS Project – Bara Semerakova

All GLOBE countries in the region can benefit from the project, although they are not a part of the consortium or members of EU.

CCs were addressed to share good examples in the field of 3 project topics (Science for Digital Learners, Early Inquiry, Science for Low Achievers). Examples can be collected both from GLOBE and out-of-GLOBE activities in their country. Bara will send a template and CCs should send the examples till the June15<sup>th</sup>.

### GLOBE school campaigns within Europe and Eurasia - Matthijs Begheyn

Matthijs introduced the Picture Contest for schools. The main goal is to make schools active at globe.gov and their work more visible at the GLOBE community. Active schools can also easily start collaboration with another school if their activity is displayed at their school public page on globe.gov.

Technical and legal issues of uploading pictures were discussed with David Overoy. Participants liked the idea and promised to spread the campaign in their countries and motivate and assist teachers to upload pictures. We need nicely filled public page of an active school that we can show as an example to others.

Matthijs together with RHDO and technology team in GPO will prepare the call for the contest and announce it to the community.

### The elections of the members of the Board of GLOBE Europe and Eurasia

The Chair of the Board facilitated the elections of the new Board. The state of Board before election: one member resigned due to other responsibilities (Kateryna Serednytska), four members were concluding their mandate this year (Karl T. Hetland, Danielle deStaerke, Magda Machinko-Nagrabecka, Matthijs Begheyn) and one has one more year on the Board (Farid Hamdan). That means the elections were held to find five members of the Board.

There were 7 nominations: Danielle de Staerke, Magda Machinko-Nagrabecka, Matthijs Begheyn, Juliette Vogel, Inese Liepina, Diana Garasic, Costas Cartalis.

The election committee (Karl T. Hetland, Bara Semerakova, Dana Votapkova) counted the votes and announced 5 people with the highest number of votes.
