Most important step – register for a free account [username, email, password] and you're set! An account allows you to create your own lists, copy other lists, change them to fit your purposes, save AND share them.

Searching

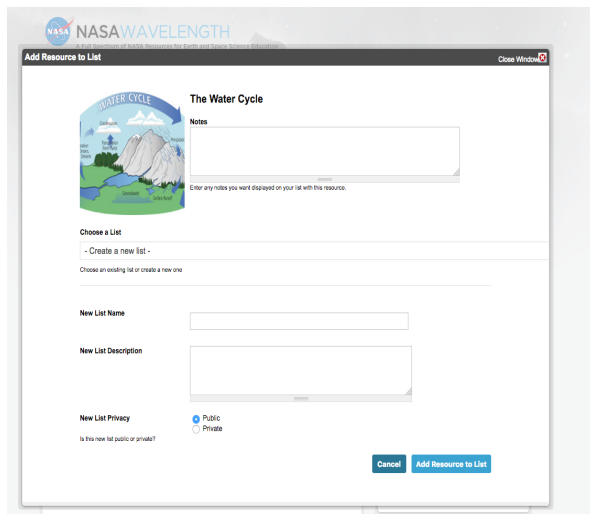
- By Audience or topic
 - Further drill down within topic area, resource type, learning time, materials cost, and instructional strategies.

Lists

- There are **featured** lists – lists created around special events or topics. Feel free to browse through these lists.
- **Public** lists – lists users have made available to anyone.
 - If you know some one who has made lists, search for them by name.
 - Search through the public lists by list title or description

If you like the list, in general but you may want to change things up a bit, copy the list and make it your own.

- **Create your own** list by searching for resources in wavelength by topic, grade, etc.



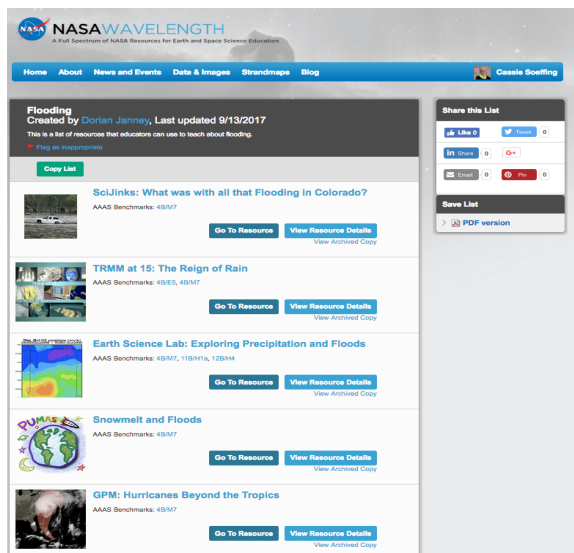
NOTES is useful information about the resource, how you might use it or features to expand upon.

Either add it to a current list or create your own, new list.

Give the list a name and describe the types of resources contained in your list.

Make it public for others to see or private – just for you and those you give a link to.

At least one resource in your list must be from the Wavelength collection.
