Characteristics

Mostly found as a shrub, about 4 m high, but with maximum height of about 8 m. Hazel generally grows as an understory species in mixed deciduous forests.

- The leaves are deciduous, rounded, 6-12cm long, 5-9 cm wide, with a double serrate margin and hairy on both sides (in most cases).
- ❖ Hazel **flowers** are grouped in hanging catkins.
- ❖ Fruit is hazel nut, green at the beginning, brown when mature, up to 2 cm long and 1.5 cm wide and partially enclosed in a leafy husk.
- The bark is greyish or reddish with white spots and horizontal lines.



Distribution

Central, western and southern Europe and somewhat eastern Europe. Not present in the northern parts of Scandinavia and the rest of northern Europe.



Don't mistake with

Carpinus betulus L., European hornbeam that has less rounded, more ovate leaves, with uniform serrate margin. Its bark is grey and without white spots. Fruit is much smaller (0.3-0.6 cm) and partially covered with three-lobed leaf.
